

Jorge Carey is Chairman of Carey, the largest law firm in Chile. He completed his elementary and high school education at the Saint George's College, and studied law at the Universidad Católica de Chile, where he graduated valedictorian of his class. Later on he continued his education by completing a Master of Comparative Law degree at New York University as a Fulbright Scholar.

As part of his professional experience, he worked for three years as a lawyer in the International Monetary Fund and the World Bank in Washington D.C., United States.

In Chile, he has been president of seven publicly traded corporations, and also served as president of the British Chilean Chamber of Commerce, the Canadian Chilean Chamber of Commerce and director of the Chilean American Chamber of Commerce (AmCham). He also served two terms as the director of the Hogar de Cristo, the largest private charity organization in Latin America. Throughout the 90s he was a member of the commission that was appointed by former President Eduardo Frei to draft the code for good corporate practices for publically traded corporations. He also served on the commission that was designated by the President of Chile, Michelle Bachelet, to amend the Foreign Investment Statute (DL600).

Currently, he is president of Carey's executive committee, president of Moneda Chile Fund, vice-president of Minera Quebrada Blanca, Enaex, AFP Provida and director of Cemento Melón, Masisa, and Instituto Libertad.

Jorge Carey continues to support his alma mater, Universidad Católica Law School, by serving as a member of the advisory board for the Master of Law Program and as director of the Center of International Studies. He is also a member of the expanded council of the "Mensaje" magazine of the Jesuit order in Chile and director of the Chilean Cultural Heritage Corporation.

Additionally, he continues to lead the defense of the Republic of Chile, in the higher suit that has ever been filed against Chile before the CIADI in Washington D.C. (USD 800 million) for the confiscation of the newspaper El Clarin in 1973. He assumed this responsibility ad honorem in 2002 at the request of the former President of Chile, Ricardo Lagos.

Jorge Carey has received many awards throughout his career. In 2007 he became the first Chilean lawyer to receive the "Lifetime Achievement Award" from Chambers and Partners, and in 2008 he was awarded "Leader of the Year" by Latin Lawyer.

His practice focuses on corporate and business law, mergers and acquisitions, project finance, and international arbitration.
